



Setting: The building occupies an urban setting principally consisting of brick masonry commercial and mixed-use buildings, in which structures typically occupy the majority of their lots and have their street facades in line with the street wall.

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

A one-story brick masonry commercial block of roughly rectangular plan, the Essex Street elevation of this building is divided into three bays of unequal width, separated by cast iron columns or (at the east end) a paneled pilaster. These support a stamped metal frieze and cornice. An anodized aluminum storefront, seven bays wide including a broad entrance bay, was constructed after 1979; it features plate glass panels set into bays which are horizontally divided, with anodized panels above and below the glazing. The entrance bay features similar detailing, with the anodized panels only above the doors in that bay.

Above the stamped metal cornice a paneled brick parapet wall extends along the entire length of the Essex Street facade. The storefront columns and pilasters are visually extended above the cornice as piers with caps and ball finials. The same facade treatment continues at a corner bay. On the Summer Street elevation the storefront treatment extends from the corner for one bay, ending in a second paneled pilaster. The stamped metal cornice extends the entire length of the Summer Street elevation; above this a parapet wall of identical design to that on the Essex Street face of the building—except that it lacks the paneled treatment used on that façade—caps the street wall. The parapet is divided into four bays; unlike the Essex Street façade, these bays do not correspond with a division of the wall below the cornice. Rather, on the Summer Street elevation, jack-arched windows and door openings with stone sills are located without respect to the rhythm established by the parapet.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

This building was built in 1897. Benjamin W. Russell sold this parcel with buildings in January 1897 to David Pingree (SED 1503/376) who is associated with the parcel on the 1897 Hopkins Atlas. David Pingree (1841-1932) one of Salem's wealthiest and influential businessmen and benefactors, at the time of his death was estimated to be one of the 20 wealthiest individuals in Massachusetts.3




Figure 1: 1906 Sanborn.

According to a 1906 Sanborn, a bakery was one of the occupants of this building at this time (see Figure 1). The city directory from 1906 confirms that a baker named H. A. Stoddard occupied the premises in this year, along with D. G. Whelton's groceries. The building was divided into three storefronts at that time, with an additional small storefront in the southeast corner of the building, identified as 3 Summer Street.

By 1915 the Mohican Company utilized the premises. A 1915 advertisement in the Salem Evening News called it "Salem's largest and busiest market" (see Figure 2 and 3). The Mohican Company still occupied the premises in 1930, 1940 and 1950 as well as another grocer named First National Stores according to city directories.

The trustees of his estate conveyed this property to Richard Wheatland (1872-1944), David Pingree's nephew, who was long involved in managing his uncle's business affairs, and who inherited the bulk of his uncle's estate.

By 1957, the New England Mutual Life Insurance Company, Kingley Insurance Agency and Jerry's men's furnishings company utilized the building.

His estate in turn conveyed the property in 1955 to Philip Segal (SED 4135/471) who was apparently acting as agent for Jerry Rich. Jerry's Department Store/Army Navy Store operated at this location for over 50 years (1954-2005). Jerry Rich (1906-1995) was a Russian Jewish immigrant. After his death the chain of Jerry's stores was taken over by the Saxe brothers.




Figure 4: View looking southeast; 1979 photograph from original MHC form, dated November 1979.

The most recent deed for this property is from 1958 where Philip Segal granted this property to Jerry Rich.⁵ New England Mutual Life Insurance Company and Jerry's men's furnishings company were also listed as occupying the building in 1964. By 1979, Jerry's men's furnishings store was still occupying the building, but at that time was called Jerry's Discount Department Store and Jerry's Army & Navy Store (see Figure 4).

This building is now wholly occupied by the Witch City Consignment store.

A small commercial block constructed in 1897, 301-307 Essex Street is eligible for inclusion on the National Register both individually and as part of an expansion of an historic district. It contributes to the district under Criteria C, as a commercial building which reflects the development of downtown Salem in the late 19th century.

The criteria that are checked in the above sections must be justified here.

This building retains distinctive characteristics of its type, period, and method of construction and reflects the historic development of Salem's downtown including the late 19th century. It retains integrity of location, design, feeling and association and contributes to an expanded Downtown Salem Historic District, the boundaries of which have not yet been formalized. The expanded District will have a period of significance that extends to include the Urban Renewal period of Salem's history.
